Autism and Collaborative Problem Solving

April is Autism awareness month, so I got to thinking about using the skills of Collaborative Problem Solving and Parenting Today Forward with children, teens and even adults who are on the autism spectrum. I found a blog entry on the Think: Kids blog and have reprinted it here for you (with permission);

While conducting a training in Oregon, one of the participants shared this amazing article from the New York Times with us: Reaching My Autistic Son Through Disney. Read it right away! And make sure to watch the video excerpt too! You won't be able to stop. Its

gripping and will bring you to tears. The dedication of these parents to understanding their child's inner world and connecting with him is inspiring. As is their son's determination to make sense of the world and

connect with others despite his challenges.

Using Collaborative Problem Solving with many kids on the autism spectrum, here's an excerpt that rang especially true: "There's a reason — a good-enough reason — that each autistic person has embraced a particular interest. Find that reason, and you will find them, hiding in there, and maybe get a glimpse of

their underlying capacities. In our experience, we found that showing authentic interest will help them feel dignity and impel them to show you more, complete with maps

many people who are challenged."

Their story shows the power of meeting kids where they are at, of joining, of listening intently for small clues to what they are experiencing and trying to communicate, immensely challenging though it might be. We are also reminded of the critical role of shared play and imagination in collaborating with children. Amazing stuff.

Deviled Egg Chicks

Ingredients:

12 large eggs hard boiled and peeled
1/3 cup mayonnaise
1 1/2 tsp Dijon mustard* or add to taste
1/4 tsp garlic powder
1/8 tsp salt or to taste
1 small carrot peeled and sliced into rings
6 black olives

Instructions:

Peel 12 hard-boiled eggs. With a sharp knife, slice off a very thin layer from the base of the egg - this will give it a flat surface to

stand on. Cut off a generous top third of the egg. Squeeze around the egg base gently to loosen the yolk and it should pop right out. Keep the lids paired with their bases.

In a medium mixing bowl, combine all yolks and mash well with a fork. Add mayonnaise, Dijon (to taste), garlic powder and salt, or season to taste. Mash until smooth. Transfer mixture to Ziploc or pastry bag and pipe generously into egg bases. Place top 1/3 back over

the base and press down slightly to adhere.

For eyes, poke through an olive with a plastic straw several times then gently squeeze down the straw and the little circles of olives will pop right out. For the beaks, thinly slice a few rings of carrot and cut each ring into sixths. Insert 2 olive spots for eyes and 2 carrot wedges the beak. Garnish with fresh parsley or dill for a "free range" feel.

Easer Egg Decorating Ideas

There is no limit to the imagination when coloring Easter eggs. Here are some ideas to spark your imagination

- Use temporary tattoos applied directly to the egg shell the same as you would to skin
- Washi tape makes a nice, no mess alternative to dying eggs.
- Stickers are another way of adding pictures and pretties to the shells of eggs either by themselves, or on an already dyed egg.
- Wrap your egg with rubber bands before dunking, Or get really creative and apply rubber bands to an already dipped egg and dip it in a darker color to make the places the

rubber bands protected, colored.

- Dye you eggs yellow and use a permanent black marker to make emoji faces on them.
- Decoupage your eggs with some tissue paper and glue.
- Wrap your egg in a paper towel and apply various colors of food coloring directly to the paper towel to create a

tie dye effect.

Whatever you choose to do with your eggs, the most important tip is to have fun.
